Major Boost for Shared Decision-Making in Germany

The Innovation Fund is a funding instrument introduced by the German government to introduce innovations in healthcare on a large scale as models and, in the event of good effects, to transfer them to standard nationwide care. In this way, Shared Decision-Making (SDM) was



introduced in almost all departments of the University Hospital Schleswig-Holstein (UKSH) in Kiel between 2017 and 2021 by means of the SHARE TO CARE program. It includes intensive training of every physician, involvement of every nurse, activation of every patient, and implementation of 80 decision aids. Complete implementation in a department is approved by an SDM certificate. The external evaluation showed that the program was feasible and

effective in increasing SDM levels and patients' health literacy. Compared to other German hospitals, the UKSH showed improved patient safety and reduced costs after implementation of SDM.

In view of these effects, the major German health insurers voluntarily decided to pay an additional fee for each patient case treated in an SDM-certified clinic of the UKSH, thus ensuring that implementation can be maintained in the long term. Therefore, all 18 departments continue the SHARE TO CARE program today. The quality criteria that constitute the SDM certificate were specified with the help of the Hamburg group to facilitate their application also beyond the UKSH. The International Shared Decision Making Society endorsed the usage of the consented quality criteria in Germany.

Recently, the Innovation Fund <u>recommended</u> the Kiel approach to be made a standard of care in Germany. In particular, the German Ministry of Health is asked to continuously provide the 80 decision aids publicly and to take legislative steps to enable a nationwide rollout.

Using the "Integrative Model of Patient-Centeredness" in the analysis of People Living with HIV (PLWH) Chilean Healthcare Program

Greetings everyone: My name is María José Vergara and I work as the nurse manager of the People Living with HIV (PLWH) healthcare program in Hospital San Pablo located in Coquimbo City, Chile. In 2020, I have started my master's degree in nursing at Pontificia Universidad Católica the Chile with the purpose of improving my research skills and developing a wider view to address the phenomena and challenges that PLWH face.

During my studies, I had the wonderful opportunity to meet Prof. Paulina Bravo, who invited me to become a member of the PCC Network. Shortly after that, I started my master's thesis to investigate which elements of patient-centered care are strengthened and weakened, respectively, in the Chilean PLWH public healthcare program. The main premise of this master's thesis is that care for PLWH is often not patient-centered. Current healthcare policies in Chile state that PLWH public healthcare programs across the country must deliver comprehensive care to PLWH. However, oftentimes these healthcare programs fit the schedules and procedures of PLWH healthcare teams rather than PLWH themselves.

This research project applies a multi-methods approach through document analysis, direct observation in two public hospital settings and semi structured interviews to PLWH and PLWH healthcare workforce. The Integrative Model of Patient-centeredness (Scholl et al., 2014; Zeh et al., 2019) is used as a reference. The application of this model can facilitate the implementation of comprehensive care for people suffering from sensitive health conditions such as HIV.
