New section on shared decision-making in a BMJ Journal

The BMJ Journal *Evidence-Based Medicine* has included a new section on shared decision-making. The aim of shared decision-making is that the clinician and the patient make health decisions together, so the decision is based on both evidence-based medicine (provided by the clinician) and the patient's unique preferences and situation (provided by the patient).

In this new section you will find many articles on shared decision-making, including original research (for example on the effectiveness of interventions to increase shared decision-making), as well as opinion papers (for example about the potential value of shared decision-making to clinical care).

New educational concept for shared decision-making in primary care training

Recently, Dr. Angelique Timmerman from the Maastricht University gave a presentation as part of our PCC NET seminar series. Dr. Timmerman is a psychotherapist and assistant professor at the department of Family Medicine. Her research currently focuses on training and assessment of doctor patient communication as well as aspects of learning. Her presentation in

a few words: "Training health care professionals in shared decision-making is considered as conditional for prolonged engagement with shared decision-making in their clinical encounters. In an Educational Design Research (EDR) study, we developed a shared decision-making curriculum for general practitioners' clinical workplace learning and evaluated learning outcomes."
